The year 2024 is progressing rapidly, and we are quickly approaching the end of the first quarter, with exciting new opportunities arising in the Agriculture sector. The recent announcement by Minister Didiza and stakeholders in the Red Meat Industry regarding exports to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia brings muchneeded relief to the sector, which has faced numerous challenges. It also presents an excellent opportunity for our work in supporting the commercialisation of Black farmers in the Red Meat value chain.

During the last quarter of 2023, the AGDA management team and board spent two days in a review and planning session to set the trajectory for 2024. Key issues that emerged include the need for expedited progress on the fund, ensuring that we can fulfil our mandate of support and inclusive growth. Financing remains a major concern for new entrants into the sector, and even established farmers are struggling with working capital issues. We also agreed to continue our value chain approach aligned with the AAMP. Our strategic focus for the year will be on potato and vegetable value chains in Blouberg, Limpopo; the livestock value chain; and grains and oil seeds. We have also been working on strategic partnerships for export commodities such as avocados, citrus, and others. Once again, I want to express my gratitude to the board for their commitment, advice, and guidance in building AGDA and supporting our work.

This quarter has also seen exciting events that provided us with an opportunity to share the AGDA story and engage with young farmers, commercial Black farmers, and other stakeholders. These engagements helped us understand the role AGDA can play in unlocking and supporting sector growth. These events highlight the importance of engagement, collaboration, and

partnerships, so that we can avoid duplicating efforts and build on successful models while supporting one another's strengths.

AGDA continues to focus on building networks that can unlock and expand opportunities for farmers. We have been engaging strategically to improve market access, access to finance, and skills development – more about these efforts will be covered in our next editions.

As an institution, we have always stressed the importance of ensuring that we are well equipped to serve our members and the sector. We warmly welcome Ms. Lynne Roos, who will head our Transaction Advisory and Project Development Unit. Lynne brings extensive experience in the sector and, most importantly, a passion for supporting the development of new entrants.

We have come to realise, as mentioned before, that numerous positive stories unfold in the sector daily. However, we often fail to take the time to celebrate them. Today, on behalf of AGDA, I congratulate one of our members, Mr. Pitso Sekhoto of Remmoho Investments, for successfully unlocking a joint venture transaction in the Free State for apple production, receiving R10 million funding from the Free State's Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (DARD). Innovative models like this are essential for driving inclusivity in the sector.

Realigning our path forward: Highlights from AGDA's strategic breakaway



Over several sessions in late November, AGDA's leadership came together for our annual strategic breakaway to assess our progress and chart our path ahead. Key topics included analysing our status, revisiting our vision, developing funding strategies, and determining organisational needs.

Reviewing Our Journey

As we approach our 5th anniversary, we reflected on AGDA's background and purpose in promoting the inclusive development of the commercial agricultural sector. Our timeline illustrates key partnerships formed, projects undertaken, funding secured and organisational milestones achieved from 2019-2023. We also did an honest SWOT analysis to guide our realignment.

Reaffirming Our Vision

We affirmed that AGDA still aligns to our founding vision for an inclusive, transformed agricultural sector. However, we realise we need to tailor our approach more to commodity value chains and market-driven models. We identified priority chains like livestock, grains, fruits and vegetables that provide opportunities to involve small and medium black farmers through partnerships across the industry.

Crafting Our Funding Mix

Our funding strategy includes attracting investment into our impact fund as well as earning professional service fees. But we also rely on corporate social investment, membership fees and institutional grants. We have set targets to incorporate a diverse funding mix anchored through strategic partnerships.

Building Organisational Capacity

Clarifying organisational roles and structures ensures we have the capabilities to deliver our vision. This includes specialist skills in areas like transaction advisory, partnerships, project implementation and fund management. We also gain guidance from board committees and want to establish an external advisory panel.

Growing up on a thriving tomato and vegetable farm in Mokopane, Kobus developed a deep love for agriculture from a young age. His journey led him to study a BSc in Agriculture at the University of Pretoria, laying the foundation for a remarkable 13-year career in vegetable farming.

Oom Kobus is set to be featured in both the AGDA social media "Wisdom Wednesday" column and the Q&A section.

In 1996, he embarked on an exciting new chapter when he joined Sakata as the Product Manager for the MayFord vegetable range. Throughout the time he spent at the company, until his retirement in 2013, Kobus played a vital role in various capacities. His responsibility included breeding new vegetable varieties specifically tailored to thrive in the unique conditions of Southern Africa. During this time, Oom Kobus conducted extensive country-wide testing, and ensured the introduction of innovative varieties to vegetable farmers across the nation. he further enriched his expertise by studying Vegetable Genetics in Israel.

With an unwavering commitment to training and mentoring the next generation of farmers, he strives to give back to the farming community that has shaped his life in such a profound way.

R10 million cash injection for the Maluti Apple Project



AGDA honoured the invitation from Remmoho Investment in Agriculture (RIA) to join them in celebrating the Thabo Mofutsanyana Apple Harvest Day held in Bethlehem, Free State. Remmoho has partnered with the Free State Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (DARD) and the Department of Small Business Development, Tourism and Environmental Affairs (DESTEA) on the Apple Project.

The harvest day showcased the first stage of the Thabo Mofutsanyana Apple Hub Initiative that will see the region producing up to 180 000 tons of apples per annum.

Chairman of Remmoho, Pitso Sekhoto took stakeholders on tour of the Maluti Fruit Pack House to demonstrate how the apples are washed, sorted, and packaged. The stakeholders included the MEC



of the Free State Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (DARD), Saki Mokoena, MEC of the Department of Small Business Development, Tourism and Environmental Affairs (DESTEA), Thabo Meeko, apple farmers, and other funders including Land Bank and Nedbank. Once the packaging is completed, the apples are

exported to international markets and distributed to local markets.

Maluti Fruit is owned by fifteen farmers in the Thabo Mofutsanyana District. Remmoho Investment also forms part of the ownership group. Pitso Sekhoto reflected on Remmoho's journey with DARD and DESTEA to have reached the

apple project's financial support by government.

DARD handed over a R10 million cheque to the Apple Project. The

project is expected to achieve a turnover of R50 million per annum once the plan is implemented. Pitso Sekhoto expressed gratitude to the MECs of the Free State provincial government for their support in the this project. He also encouraged other farmers to work hard and to always knock on doors until they also get assistance.

Ayoob Dulla of Zuurbekom, received training in vegetable production from AGDA in 2021 during the Grow to Market training session in Jabulani, Soweto. He completed the AGDA programme in 2022 while farming in his backyard. Ayoob now farms on a 2-ha farm in Zuurbekom, West Rand, where he employs one person. Ayoob is one of the many hard-working farmers who, after spotting social media posts on the training, decided to grab the opportunity, and enrolled. He has never looked back since.

He reflects on his journey with AGDA from the beginning to date. Ayoob cites how AGDA has played a key role in grooming him as a farmer by providing him with initial seeds, equipment and advise after the training, "Kobus Van Heerden has done a sterling job in providing me with the necessary knowledge on how to run my farm and look after the plants."


"With AGDA's continued support, I have been able to employ one



person with whom I work on a 600m² land, and we have so far produced various kinds of vegetables which we sell to the local community" says Ayoob.

AGDA has aided Ayoob by sponsoring the de-bushing of the land where he has planted maize which he will be harvesting soon.

Ayoob wishes that AGDA could get the necessary financial support to enable it to continue to aid people like him, who are venturing into farming.
